
EIGHT-LEGGED LIFE

Stand under the spider in the living room and observe it very carefully.

One of the most remarkable characteristics of spiders is that they are great silk producers. They make this silk inside their bodies and then, they push it outwards. Spiders are famous for the webs they create, but not all use them to catch food, some use them to build their burrows or protect their eggs.

THE WOODPECKER

Knock, knock! It is the sound that the woodpecker makes when its beak hits the trees.

Look inside this forest for other birds, some are resting and others watching from the sky.

The woodpecker carries out important functions within a forest. This bird builds holes in trees, which it uses as a burrow for its family or to rest. When it decides to change nests, they are used by other animals that cannot build this type of burrows to protect themselves from the cold of winter.

THE YELLOW SNAKE

The snake is an animal that can smell with its tongue, see heat, and hear with its mouth. It moves its long pink tongue to feel the air, the ground or the water and be able to move. Some snakes cannot see well and that is why they can feed with other senses using two small holes right in front of their eyes.
